CIVIC CENTRE TOURS

For many students, their first experience of government in action comes on a school trip to the Penrith Civic Centre and Central Library.

Council encourages students to visit their local Council and learn how their Council operates. If you are learning about government at school it is very simple to organise a visit all you have to do is to get your teacher to ring the Council on (047) 32 7644 and make an appointment. The tours are approximately 60 minutes in duration and we cater for groups of up to 30 students. Each visit includes a tour around the public areas of the building.

If required, Council tours can be specifically tailored to cater for individual requirements. If a group has an area of special interest, it can make arrangements for detailed information by contacting Council before the visit.

In general when you visit the Council on an educational visit you will learn about the following:

- levels of government
- brief history of Penrith, local government and Penrith City Council
- How are Councillors elected and what do they do
- * services and facilities provided by Penrith City Council
- * where Council gets its money from and how it is spent

Younger students are catered for as well. They are given a basic knowledge of who their civic representatives are and their role in providing the services needed for effective administration of the city.

As part of their visit to Council students are given an information kit to reinforce what they see in the Council Chambers.
