## The Grand Legacy Of *The Towers*

Once upon a time, there stood on the site of Penrith High School a striking landmark of the district — a large home with high twin towers. Dr Barber, the master of this imposing edifice, had added these towers to the original structure to give it something of the appearance of an Irish castle which he had seen and admired. His home quickly became known as The Towers — the name we have appropriated for our magazine.

Originally, *The Towers* magazine was in fact a jumble of bits and pieces of literary works from students within the school, mashed together and published to commemorate the transformation of Penrith High. From an intermediate high school, in 1950 we became a full high school, complete with the fresh energies of new and eager students, all bursting with promise, talent, and enthusiasm.

In 1952, *The Towers* was revived as the first official year book of Penrith High. Since that time, the magazine has been published annually, as a way to remember the trials and triumphs of the year. It is now grown into a firmly established and enthusiastically continued tradition. The copy you are clutching contains within its pages the many achievements and unforgettable moments of this year, a continuation of the unbroken heritage which has been passed down, through the generations, into your hands.

## Principal Matters

The publication of *The Towers* always seems to herald for the school the imminent closure of the academic year. At such a time as this, it seems natural to reflect on the successes of the Penrith High School Community.

For Penrith High School, the results of the 1997 HSC candidature were outstanding; Melinda Roylett, Alison Smith, and Bradley Steel topped the state in Legal Studies, Visual Arts and Physics, respectively. To have
