



Principal freed after thirty nine years devotion to education.

In November of this year, MrP. Press, long time principal of Penrith High School, will leave these hallowed halls to take up a new calling in life, that of retired teacher.



Mr Press was born in Gulargambone, NSW,

in 1939, the only son of Osca and Phyllis Press. His first contact with the education system of NSW occurred when he was enrolled in Gulargambone Primary school (and later Central school) in 1946. At the age of thirteen, he left home to attend Dubbo High School for four years, completing the Leaving Certificate (now the HSC) in 1956.

At first, he boarded at a church hostel for boys for fifteen months but later moved into more pleasant circumstances in a private home. He enjoyed all aspects of school life, especially playing cricket and football. However, a broken leg in 1956 put a finish to his football career.


- He obtained an excellent pass in the Leaving Certificate and accepted a Teachers Scholarship to Sydney University, where he studied for a Bachelor of Science Degree. He graduated with majors in Chemistry and Pure Mathematics in 1957 and followed this with a Diploma in Education being qualified to teach both Science and Mathematics.

His first appointment was to Quirindi High School at the beginning of 1961, where he was the only Physics / Chemistry teacher on the staff. He was also expected to teach a senior Maths class. After five years he was appointed Maths Master and stayed at Quirindi until the end of 1969.

In 1970, he transferred to Nepean High as Maths Master. This was the beginning of his association with the Penrith area, and he developed a great liking for it and its students. Eager for promotion,

he was appointed to
Narromine High School
(1980-1982) and then Dubbo
High School (1983-1985) as
Deputy Principal. It was
interesting to return to his
old school as Deputy and
work with some of his
former teachers who were
still on the staff. 1986 saw
his appointment as Principal
at Penrith High School, a
position he has occupied
for the past fourteen years.

In the future, Mr Press intends to live in the Penrith area and travel



around Australia, especially the Top End and the western parts of the country. Most importantly, he intends to enjoy more time with his wife, Shirley, his two children and his new grandchild. "I am looking forward to being able to have time to myself to do those simple things that I have not been able to do in the past."

A skilled model builder, Mr Press has a keen interest in trains and model railways. Recently, however, a fascination for sailing boats has surfaced. "Strange," he reflects, "for a person raised in far western NSW where water is a rare commodity." For many years, he has been an enthusiastic lawn bowler, enjoying both the friendship and the competition.

In his time at PHS, Mr Press has overseen its biggest change, from local comprehensive school to selective high school. Of this metamorphosis he says: "It has been a privilege to have been the Principal of the school during this time and I hope that I have made some small contribution to this change. Observing the changes that have taken place to this school, and the work and dedication of both staff and students convinces me that there is a place in our education system for this type of school."

We congratulate Mr Press on a long and successful career in education, and wish him a happy, healthy and fruitful retirement.
